


The first flag presented was Washington's Cruisers. In September 1775, the Americans launched two floating batteries on the Charles River, Massachusetts, and in the following month they opened fire on the enemy in Boston. In October, Washington also commissioned two schooners, the Lynch and the Franklin, to cruise the Bay. When speaking of these schooners, Col. Joseph Reed, Washington's secretary, in a letter from Cambridge, Massachusetts, dated October 20, 1775, said, "Please fix upon some particular color for a flag, and a signal by which our vessels may know one another. What do

you think of a flag with a white ground and a tree in the middle, the motto 'AN APPEAL TO HEAVEN' - this is the flag of our floating batteries."

The second flag was Proctor's Battalion. This is the Rattlesnake Flag of Colonel John Proctor's 1st Battalion Westmoreland County, Pennsylvania. Tradition holds that the flag was made in 1775 at Hanna's Town from a pre-existing British standard. The retention of the British symbol on the flag indicates that the inhabitants of Westmoreland County, although ready to resist the tyrannical acts of the British Parliament, still considered themselves loyal subjects of King George III.

In the center of the field is a rattlesnake coiled to strike. The snake's thirteen rattles signify the American colonies. The rattlesnake was painted directly on the silk, as is the



President Anderson shared information about the Enhanced JROTC Program that allows each chapter to select an Outstanding JROTC Cadet from those recommended by the commanding officers of participating schools. Cadets are selected from those who most exemplify the principle of the citizen soldier and high degree of merit with respect to leadership qualities, military bearing, general excellence, and completion of an essay. Our chapter historically has one candidate for this award each year, but through the hard work of our JROTC Chairman, Roy Adkins, our program had five candidates for this award this year. President Anderson announced the winning cadet for 2916 is Cadet 1st Lt Cameron Castillo.

Cadet 1st Lt Cameron J. Castillo is a junior at Vanden High School in Fairfield and is in his third year of AFJROTC. He is the Flight Commander for his class of 24 cadets as well as commander of the Kitty Hawk Air Society (AFJROTC's Honor Society.) He has received 4 AFJROTC national level awards (more than anyone in his flight), and he has also been named Outstanding Cadet of the Year, two years in a row. Cameron is carrying a 4.22 GPA, and is currently ranked 24th out of 384 students. He plans on attending one of the service academies after his graduation from Vanden High School.

President Anderson invited Cadet Castillo to come forward and read his essay. He then was presented an Outstanding Cadet Certificate by President Anderson, a medallion by Roy Adkins and a check for \$250 by Don Littlefield. Roy Adkins also shared with the members that Cadet Castillo was just named top cadet for CASSAR.

President Anderson announced that the Sacramento Chapter participated in the SAR 8th Grade Brochure Contest this year under the guidance of Secretary Carl Ahlberg. Our winning entry was from Matthew Martin of Our Lady of the Assumption School.

After dinner President Anderson introduced our guest speaker, John Hess. John is a Consulting Civil Engineer with HDR Engineering in Folsom, CA, and is retired from a 36 year career with the US Army Corps of Engineers in Sacramento. He resides in Somerset, CA, with wife Mary, and has two grown children. He is an active historical re-enactor, with the Delaware Regiment of the American Revolution, as well as Lewis & Clark, and Napoleonic era. At the end of March he will be going to Mount Vernon for a large reenactment, and later in the year a Yorktown reenactment.

Mr. Hess started his presentation with a quote from David McCullough, "How can we know who we are and where we are going if we don't know anything about where we have come from and what we have been through, the courage shown, the costs paid, to be where we are?" He went on to give a history of who the Delaware Regiment was and what they did during the Revolutionary War. They originally formed in 1775 under Col John Haslet with 8 companies and total of 750 men. By the end of the war they were down to one company. They fought in almost every major battle during the struggle for freedom - Long Island, White Plains, Trenton, Brandywine, Cowpens, Guilford Courthouse and Yorktown to name a few.

The current reenactment group was formed in 1976 to ignite interest in America history. The group recreates as accurately as possible the life and times of soldiers and civilian camp people during the Revolutionary War era. Mr. Hess went on to explain the uniform worn by a soldier, the weapons soldiers would have used and camp gear they carried every day. The Delaware Regiment participates in a number of events each year — Mt Vernon Heritage Day, Presidents Day, Spring Reenactment, Nevada City Constitution Day, and Veterans Day Parade. Mr. Hess said his group is always looking to add new members and encouraged anyone interested to talk to him or call him.

President Anderson thanked our guest and presented him with a Certificate of Appreciation and a Liberty Bell. President Anderson made the following announcements:

Patriot Biograpy

Patriot Bio David Hoard (p-182504)

David Hoard was one of the nine children of Edward Hoar and Martha Cole. His widow Lydia (Gates) Hoard stated in her widow's pension file (W.16298) that they were married in Little Hoosack, Albany County (now Rensselaer County, New York of 6 October 1783. David's brother, Samuel Hoard, who was married to Lydia's sister Lucy, made an affidavit stating that David died in 1805 in Sheldon, Genesee County. He was 48 at the time of his death. His death was recorded as the first death in Genesee County caused by a falling tree. Samuel testified that both he and David entered the service at the same time in Little Hoosack under Col. Wynkoop for nine months and marched to Ticonderoga after Col. Ethan Allen took the fort. He heard David state that he was also with the boats to help bring the army from the Isle of Aux during the retreat from Quebec, that he served under Capt. Harrison and marched to Palmerstown, and that David served as a substitute for him (Samuel) in the Militia and marched to Stillwater when Burgoyne was at Bemis Heights. Both David and Samuel were called out in the militia to Schoharie under Lt. Hubbs after Burgoyne's surrender. David then enlisted again and served at Fort Stanwix under Capt. Joseph Harrison. Lydia's claim for a pension was originally rejected but with the help of her brother Seth Gates, a bill was introduced in the 2nd Session of the 26th Congress in 1841 (Rep. No. 139) and upon examination, it was determined that the evidence provided by Samuel Hoard and Lodowick Thomas was overlooked and Lydia claim was approved.

The only son listed in the pension files was Henry Hoard who served in the War of 1812.
